# Selling Non-prescription Drugs in General Sales Stores in Lithuania

Introduction.

Pharmacy specialists retain a strong control of prescribed and non-prescribed drugs (e.g. France) but in countries like the Netherlands, Poland and others selected non-prescribed drugs may be sold in General Sales Stores (GSS). Currently one of the main topics in healthcare system in Lithuania is the possibility of selling non-prescription drugs (or OTC) in GSS.

### Aim:

To analyze the opinion of selling of non-prescription drugs in GSS in Lithuania from public and pharmacy specialists points of view.

#### Tasks:

To collect surveys from public and pharmacy specialists; To compare with the results of PMR Research company's survey, carried in Poland in 2011.

## Design of Research.

Two different questionnaires (for public and for pharmacy specialists) were prepared. After collecting the data, statistical analysis were performed.

### Results.

Most of the pharmacy specialists disagree with selling of non-prescribed drugs in GSS while public opinion is less rigid, but most of the responders agree that they would lack a consultation from a specialist. Nevertheless, as one of the main advantages public sees the ability to buy non-prescribed drugs in GSS in emergency cases while in the survey of PMR Research it was the least important priority.

### Conclusions:

Public is more likely than pharmacy specialists to agree with selling non-prescribed drugs in GSS. Results of our public survey have similarities with PMR Research survey.
